A funsheet for **Pre-K** through **first grade** museum visitors and their adult attendants

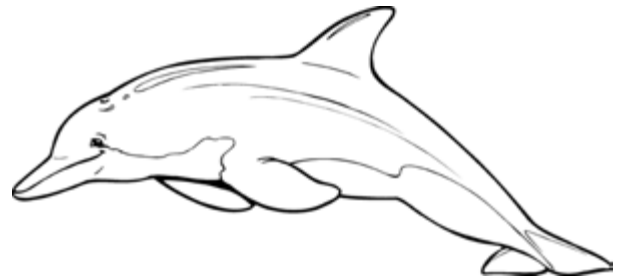
Explore the objects, photographs, and art in the **Paths of Life** exhibit.

Look in the **SERI** section for...

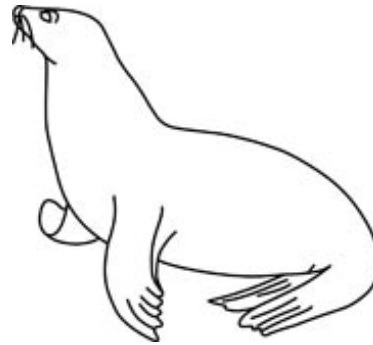
DOLPHIN

Many **dolphins** live in the Sea of Cortez. The Seri people live in Mexico, in an area of the Sonoran Desert next to the Sea of Cortez.



SEA LION

Sea lions live in the Sea of Cortez and on the seashores of Sonora, Mexico.



ROADRUNNER

Roadrunners like to walk and run, but they can also fly. Many live in the Sonoran Desert.



Look in the **YAQUI** section for...

PRAIRIE DOG

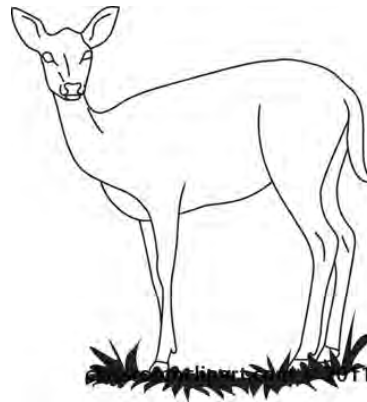
The **prairie dog** is not a type of dog. It is a type of ground squirrel that makes a sound like a dog's bark.

Mexican **prairie dogs** live in northern Mexico, which is the original homeland of the Yaqui people.



DEER

Did you also see a man dressed like a **deer**? He is the Yaqui Deer Dancer, who dances to honor the life of the **deer** during religious ceremonies.



HAWK

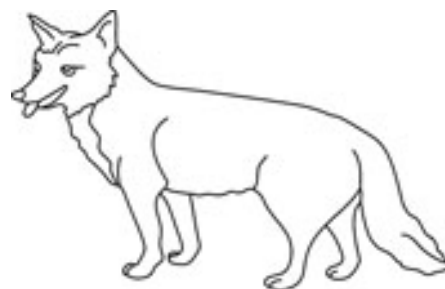
Did you see any other types of birds in the painting of the Yaqui Flower World? How many of the birds in the painting are flying?

COYOTE

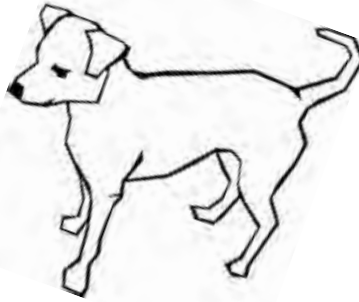
In many American Indian stories, the **coyote** is a smart and sometimes tricky animal, who helps or guides people. The Southern Paiute tell a story of how the coyote carried their people to their homeland in the southwestern United States.



Look in the **APACHE** section for...

DOG

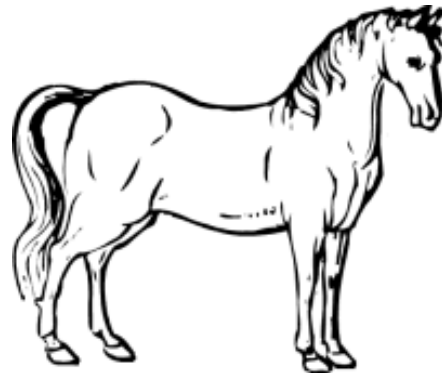
Dogs are an important part of tribal life, as pets, protectors, and hunters. Before the Apache settled in the southwestern United States, they used dogs to pull sleds filled with supplies.



HORSE

Many American Indian tribes use **horses** for hunting, farming, sports, and travel. The Apache were one of the first tribes to learn to ride horses.

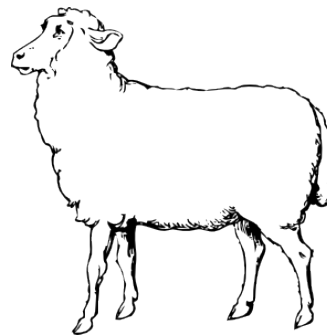
Keep an eye out for **horses** in the **Navajo** section too!



Look in the **NAVAJO** section for...

SHEEP

Navajo weavers spin wool from **sheep's** coats into yarn. They use the yarn to weave rugs, blankets, and clothing. The Navajo reservation is the biggest in the country. It is located in Northern Arizona, New Mexico, and Southern Utah.
